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## **Desperation to Passion**

Once the process of cleaning up the wreckage begins, the ways that we need to grow may not be visible from the outside. We go from being totally impulsive to feeling like our decisions have to be permanent. Something has to drive us or draw us. We need a purpose, or we start entertaining ourselves with obsession and compulsion. There is something about being stuck that feels hopeless, and easily turns into complacency and indifference. It can feel wrong or embarrassing to be struggling to keep the light on in our own recovery when we think we are supposed to be carrying the message to others. The responsibility we feel to carry a message can serve as an excuse not to share the truth about our lives. But without the truth, we have no message at all. And when we are not open, it's hard for light to get in. Admitting is the beginning of change.

Putting the life back in our recovery is really not that hard. We look for the passion, and we nurture it. The hard part is finding the willingness to take action and pick up the phone or go to a meeting when we are feeling uninspired. There is magic and a healing grace in meetings, but we cannot see it when our attitude blinds us. Coming back to meetings after we have been gone for a while can be awkward and difficult, or it can be like coming home. There is a sweetness to walking into a room we have not been in for some time and seeing so much unchanged. Still, meetings make more sense when we attend them regularly. When we drift in and out, they can seem dull and boring. Part of the magic comes from continuity: seeing each other grow and change, watching the miracle unfold in one another's lives. Occasionally someone shares brilliant words. More often the brilliance is in what we see, not what we hear.

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GOD, grant us knowledge that we may write according to Your Divine precepts. Instill in us a sense of Your purpose. Make us servants of Your will and grant us a bond of selflessness, that this may truly be Your work, not ours—in order that no addict, anywhere, need die from the horrors of addiction."

## I Brought the First NA Starter Package to Chicago

One of the greatest service contributions for the NA program happened for me in 1978. I was going back to Chicago to visit my family and somehow Jimmy K. got wind of it. Jimmy knew from my sharing in meetings that the last time I went back to Chicago in November of 1976 1 got loaded, so unbeknownst to me, Jimmy came up with a plan. The next time I saw Jimmy prior to my trip, Jimmy asked if I would do him a favor. He said that he had gotten correspondence from the Chicago area that they would like to start NA meetings in Chicago; and he'd like for me to take an NA starter package back there when I go visit. He told me that there would be a person willing to come meet with me wherever I choose. By then I was close to two (2) years clean and my sister was finally willing to let me stay at her house in the Hyde Park area of Chicago so this is where I decided to meet with this NA member. This would have been an altogether different story if I would have had the guy meet me where I grew up on the "low-end" of Chicago (35<sup>th</sup> Street); but I digress.

Once I got to my sister's place and got settled-in, I gave the guy a call and told him my sister's address. A couple hours later I answered my sister's door and there stood this tall blonde guy with a big smile on his face stating that he was there to pick-up the NA starter package. At this stage of my recovery, I had "0" social skills or ability to communicate, so I just gave him the starter kit without offering him in to sit and talk about recovery. The only info I got from him was that he was from a suburb of Chicago, not the inner city, and had a long drive to get there and a long drive home.

When I got back to Los Angeles I ran into Jimmy and he asked me "how did it go?" I told him that I met the guy at my sister's house and did indeed give him the starter package as we discussed. Jimmy looked at me and as he nodded without saying anything I detected a mischievous smile on his face and he just nodded with approval and walked away.

For years I relished in the fact that I brought the first NA starter package to Chicago which possibly helped create the first NA meeting in Chicago. It wasn't until the "fog" lifted many years later that it dawned on me what actually happened in that whole scenario. The truth is, Jimmy could have sent that starter package by mail or UPS; he didn't need me to take it personally. Jimmy knew that maybe if he gave me an "NA responsibility", maybe I wouldn't get loaded this time when I went back to Chicago, and what do you know....it worked! That's the kind of man Jimmy was; not only with me but with all recovering addicts! I love that man.


#### **New Attitude - Meeting of Narcotics Anonymous**



When we left that location, we moved to Exposition and 7th Avenue, we were there briefly, at which point we moved on to Gage Avenue and was there for about 2 years. So many recovering addicts were there on Sunday. We left that location and moved to 73rd and Crenshaw right down the street from where I lived. We were at that location for close to 10 years. There was a young lady who was our first secretary (unfortunately I don't remember her name). However, during that time Tommy C was the Secretary and so was Diamond. Every Sunday the meeting was packed to its full capacity. Curtis became the coffee person and Carolyn K. and I (may she RIP), would go early to set the meeting up. There have been some amazing years, being a part of this group.

Presently we are at Spiritual Living Center in Inglewood, where we have been for several years. Currently John N. is Secretary, and I am the Co-Secretary and the zoom person. Veeta is our amazing Treasurer; Blythe is the chip and cake person. Erin is our Literature person; Kimberly J. is our GSR and Tony is our coffee person. Kalene is a home group member. We are still thriving and are a upstanding group in the Greater Los Angeles Area of NA. We have always had a home group. Even before we separated from San Gabriel Valley and became the Greater Los Angeles Area of N.A...
